








Birmingham is the second largest city in the United Kingdom and it is also the UK's second largest market for doing business, with a thriving manufacturing industry and growing service and tourism sector.



Bristol is the city of bridges, balloons, boats, bikes, Brunel and Banksy. It is a vibrant, diverse & innovative university city with its own unmistakable identity, carved out by a strong artistic streak, rich maritime history and passionate locals.

Although very much a modern European city, Bristol's history goes back thousands of years. This is very visible from the eclectic mix of buildings lining the streets and the abundance of nationally important heritage sites. Bristol is a real melting pot of architecture through the ages from the gothic masterpieces of Bristol Cathedral and St Mary Redcliffe to the iconic Clifton Suspension Bridge.

Enjoy Bristol's famous nightlife, year-round festivals, independent cinemas and the many galleries showcasing the work of both classic and cutting-edge artists. The city is also the home of infamous street artist Banksy and as a result, has become a centre for new and emerging street artists whose wry and subversive humour is colourfully celebrated around the town.

Location







- Edinburgh's Festivals Edinburgh has a jam-packed festival schedule all year around and especially during the summer (where the population of the city is said to double) when city hosts the world-famous Edinburgh International Festival and Edinburgh Festival Fringe
- Literature The first ever UNESCO City of Literature, Edinburgh has given rise to some of the world's best known writers, among them Sir Walter Scott (Ivanhoe), Robert Louis Stevenson (Treasure Island), Arthur Conan Doyle (Sherlock Holmes) and J.K. Rowling (Harry Potter).
- Heritage Edinburgh's iconic historic buildings include Edinburgh Castle; the Palace of Holyrood house; St. Giles' Cathedral; and the Scott Monument and the city is home to two UNESCO World Heritage Sites (the Old and New Towns of Edinburgh and the Forth Bridge).

Edinburgh wellis connected city. Strategic road, rail, and air routes link Edinburgh with other major cities in the UK and internationally. Trains from Edinburgh Waverley station offer swift journeys Glasgow (42)minutes). Aberdeen (two hours 30 minutes and London (four hours 20 minutes).
